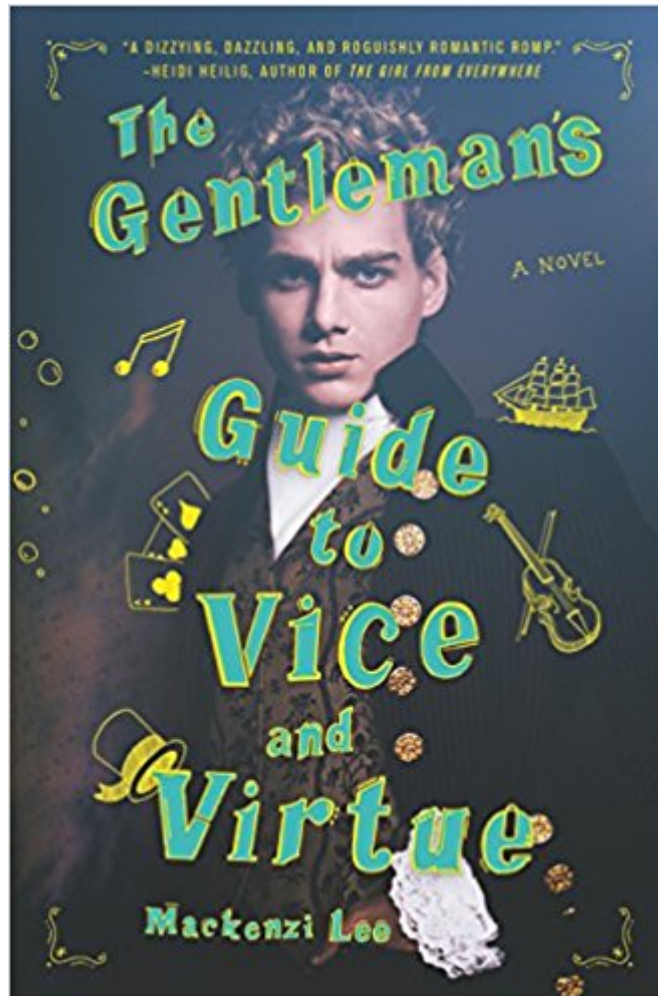




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The Gentleman's Guide To Vice And Virtue

I cannot even describe how much I adore this book. Henry “Monty” Montague is an English lord going on a year long tour of Europe with his sister, Felicity, and best friend/secret crush Percy, but they very quickly get sidetracked. They go on a huge romp of an adventure, that twists through European cities, glamorous parties at Versailles, to robbers and pirates. This book is a masterclass in voice. Monty has such a distinct view of the world. He’s funny, sarcastic, often oblivious, irreverent. And yet, he cares deeply for Percy, is often desperately unhappy with his life and does his best to cope. Even if it starts out light-hearted, the stakes are quickly raised, both physically and emotionally. The trio of Monty, Percy and Felicity is a perfect group to go on this adventure. Even though Monty is such a distinct character, Felicity and Percy are never overpowered by him and are allowed their own complexities and narratives, as they often challenge Monty’s somewhat limited view of the world. (Felicity starts off as “the annoying younger sister” but completely escapes that trope and ends up as a true member of the trio, with her own valuable contributions. She’s amazing.) The romantic tension between Monty and Percy is charming and heartbreaking in all the right ways. As fun as this book is at times, there are moments that are so poignant and basically

ripped my heart out. Similarly, the book does not ignore topics like sexism, racism, and homophobia and addresses them carefully within the narrative. I can't recommend it highly enough. So good that I read it twice in one month!

After sitting on this book for a while after reading it. I decided to upgrade my review to a 4.5 out of 5. Action-packed, adventurous, fun and funny read. There was even a small magical element to this book. I feel like this book had pretty good character development. I really enjoyed the two main characters Monty and Percy. The romance was cute but not too over the top. Even though Monty is a very flirtatious, party-goer, over the top, drinker....he's super fun and hilarious at times. I literally found myself laughing out loud. I would definitely read this book again in the future and recommend it for a fun and fast read.

I must admit to my own blunder. After the first chapter I thought that maybe this book wasn't up to par. I was not in the mood for a slow read and after skimming the pages ahead I had nearly dubbed this book as such. I can't say the exact page that changed my mind, but I flew ahead and soon I was halfway through. When did this get so action packed? When did the characters get so likeable? When did I get so invested that I would rather tuck further into the pages instead of watching the 90 Day Fiancé reunion? This book is everything. No, quite literally everything. A forbidden romance, mysterious, progressive, thrilling and not to mention all the adventures they get into! You would not expect such a book from those first few pages. And such memorable characters, I almost don't want to refer to them as such, it seems to undermine the realness of their personalities. Oh the personality present in this book! In Henry (Monty), the narrator, especially. Whimsical, full of life, rebellious and exploring the complexities of being bisexual in the 18th century. The guy he fancies, Percy, is half African-American and the perfect compliment to Henry. His sister Felicity seems to be a bit stuck-up at first, but you soon see her character unravel and her strength becomes clear, along with the fact that the 18th century didn't favor strong, educated women. They're my favorite group, surviving in those times as an African American, bisexual and a woman who wants to learn more than the proper mannerisms for society in school. Oh and don't get me started on the originality of the setting- Henry's tour of Europe, with Percy and Felicity (although she's kept from their outings and was sent along to be dropped off at school- where she would be stuck learning about being a lady rather than what she would like). It is in France that Henry gets them into some trouble of course, and then the novel takes off! I felt like I was in the passenger seat driving past a very eventful street, trying to take it all in but also anxious to get to the destination. And we arrived in a

blink. This book was delicious to say the least. Very refreshing in the days of vampire, fairy and apocalyptic novels. Though, I will never tire of the latter. Cheers, to a book previously presumed to be dry, for being so flavorful!

Ok. Ok. OK. This book is truly fantastic. There is humor, romance, adventure and some diverse and badass characters. I can not remember reading really any LGBTQ ya books when I was younger, and I really wish I had books like this one when I was. Also I feel like now all YA LGBTQ books are contemporaries about how hard it is to be different or whatever. Anyway, I LOVE this book. Also it is well researched and historical! This review is all over the place and rambling but all I am saying is just read it. Do it. Also I usually hate photographs of people on covers, but this one is cute.

This is one of the most entertaining and fully developed stories I've ever had the pleasure of reading. It has incredibly charming and laugh out loud comical moments, and still manages to address a variety of issues in a way that demonstrates the author really cares about them. She even takes it a step further by including her research at the end of the book, which I think was wise and provided more fascinating reading material. Were you curious to learn more about race relations, homosexuality, and medical treatments of the time (I won't spoil the story by specifying for what), Lee offers some background and suggestions for further reading. I'm really looking forward to what she has in store for us next.

As far as Historical Fiction catches my interest, I am so in love with *The Gentleman's Guide to Vice and Virtue* by Mackenzi Lee. *Monty's Not-So-Much-Of-A-Grand-Tour* had left me rolling on the floor, laughing; curled up at the corner, sobbing; clenched at the edge of suspense with excitement; but most of all, heart pounding for the forbidden romance that has had me falling.
